Automatic generation of BibTeX files

As well as creating BibTeX records manually, it is also possible to automatically generate records either by exporting reference details from reference management software (if you are using it) or exporting reference details from search tools such as databases, journal webpages and Google Scholar.

For further information on export from reference management software please see separate guides.


Export from databases

Many databases allow automatic export/download of reference data into BibTeX file(s). Major databases allow bulk export of selected records in one operation e.g. Web of Science Core Collection, Engineering Village, Scopus. Other databases allow export of individual records e.g. DBLP.

The process is similar for most of these databases:

- Items are selected from a list of search results (either by ticking boxes or saving to a working folder)
- The export/download/save option is selected (with BibTeX chosen as the output format)
- The downloaded file is saved (include .bib after file name if save option only gives .txt file option)


Example: Web of Science Core Collection



Export from journal webpages

BibTeX records can also be downloaded from major journal webpages either from the article/issue webpage or from search results.
